


Beaver Tales

The Cub Pack started off December meetings with a holiday party. We made huge painted "graffiti" murals, which was a continuation of our graffiti meeting in September.

Afterwards, the Cubs decorated (and ate!) Christmas cookies. It was easy to tell that the Cubs really enjoyed these creative (and delicious) activities because for the first time in recent Cub history, the room was actually perfectly quiet as the Cubs concentrated on their designs! To finish the meeting, the Cubs took turns in Akela's seat and reading stories from the Jungle Book.



For our second December meeting, we learned some basic first aid skills from volunteers from St. John's Ambulance. The Cubs learned how to recognize and treat simple wounds, sprains, fractures and hypothermia. They practiced using their neckers as a triangle bandage to wrap hand wounds, head wounds and to make slings-ask your cub to demonstrate how to wrap a knife cut on your palm. We will be continuing our first aid training in January.







Our last meeting in December was our annual visit to Perley Rideau Veteran's retirement home. For this visit, we linked with the Beavers. We divided into two groups and then joined the Veteran's in an activity room. We started by singing some traditional holiday songs and in one group, two of our Cubs, Kenny Kurita, and Samuel Blauer, accompanied some songs on the piano.



We then enjoyed a snack with the residents and the Cubs and Beavers helped the residents with a holiday picture frame craft. As always, the residents loved meeting the kids and many of them were interested in finding out what scouting is all about these days and then telling the kids stories about what scouting was like when the they were young.





For our first meeting in January, we will be badge testing -if your Cub gets bored over the holidays, that's a great time to suggest they work on badges. 


Scout Trails

It was interesting to see all the different designs the teams came up with and very impressive that all teams managed to get a good campfire going despite the damp weather. During the orienteering, the teams learned how to use maps and compasses and all teams found their waypoints- although some teams learned that going extra fast was not necessarily the best strategy since it meant missing waypoints and having to repeat!









On Saturday evening, we had a campfire run by the Scouts, followed by more wide games. The following morning was pack-up, make-your-own trail mix, and a Scout's Own.



Throughout the weekend, the Cubs got to experience another new activity: cooking! Although Cubs help out with clean-up after meals, Scouts also do all their own cooking. The third year Cubs benefited from the mentorship of the Scouts and each of them had a cooking shift. Throughout the weekend, the Scouts made the Cubs (and Cub Leaders!) feel welcome and helped them adapt to the new expectations at the Scout level.
