We stopped for a rest every 20 minutes or so, and ate lunch in the trees below the summit.

The downside to a well packed trail is that it was very icy in places - making the descent a little tricky (and painful) in places. Sliding down long stretches is a great option for a 16 year old Vent; less so for the 50 odd-years Scouter! 5 hours after the start, we were back at the trailhead, having bagged our first peak. A quick change of clothes and we were off to Lake Placid for sightseeing, souvenirs and pizza.
