


They played board games and enjoyed a great campfire and good food. The Scouts and Cubs

Where do get we get a Campfire Blanket?

Parents: You may have noticed that scouting youth get crests for attending events, participating in activities and fundraisers and can even trade them with other Scouts. You may have also noticed that we have a tradition of sewing them on our campfire blankets.

These blankets are great for keeping warm around the campfire and at night. They also allow the youth to show off all their crests! But,



where do you get one? You can use any wool or fleece blanket and sew the crests right on it.

Or the Scout Shop on Baseline Rd. also sell them. Both make great birthday presents and would be useful for spring camps. Get sewing!

The blue fleece poncho type is the nicest, warmest and softest one and sells for \$27.99 for the smaller size and \$34.99 for the larger size.



The grey acrylic blanket sells for \$13.99 for the smaller size and \$19.99 for the larger size.



Quartermaster Needed!!



The 101st needs one or two individuals to take on the role of Quartermaster. We have needed this person for some time and the matter is becoming more pressing.

The Quartermaster should be familiar with camping gear in particular.

What is the role?

- Keep an inventory of all of our gear stored in the group equipment cupboard under the stairs at the church
- 2) Keep the storage space neat and organized
- Keep track of what is in need of repair such as tents (you don't necessarily need to be the one to organize the repair but that would be ideal)
- Be informed when a section or Leaders remove any gear from the cupboard for use (such as for a camp) and ensure it is returned in good shape
- Provide advice to the Group Commissioner on equipment needs and repairs and attend one or two Group Committee meetings per year
- Be involved in a meeting in the Fall where the Scouts and/or Cubs set up tents, stoves and lanterns to ensure they work

While not as exciting as being Q in a James Bond movie, this is a good way to get involved. See Group Commissioner, Francois Marier, if this interests you.

New Gear bought with our Trillium Grant

In 2013, the 101st received a Trillium Foundation Grant, which was mainly for the purchase of new gear. We bought new snowshoes (used at OPE, during the Klondike Derby, in the Adirondacks, on hikes at Pine Grove, etc.), new tents (used on numerous camps even in Newfoundland last



summer) and lots of much needed new camping equipment. Each section is now fully stocked for feeding hungry Scouts (and Leaders) during a weekend camp. Our last purchase included new water jugs, stoves, lantern, axes, saws, and lots of very compact and lightweight gear for the Scouts and Venturers to do more backpack and canoe camping.



But where to put it in our already overstuffed gear storage cupboard? That meant a Saturday afternoon spent at the church taking everything out and reorganizing it. Thanks Scouters Dan and Bill and Scouter Sara's husband Steve. Now, if we only had a Quartermaster...
