Scoutrees 2019

Every year, thousands of scouts and volunteers head out at the beginning of May to plant Scoutrees. This is a way for Scouts to make a difference for the environment and to beautify their community. Last year, the 101st Ottawa planted 110 trees in a park off River Road.

But, Scoutrees is also an important fundraiser for our group. Each youth member will soon receive a pledge enveloppe to collect donations, of which our scouting group gets to keep 85% to fund our programs, camps, equipment, etc. Those who donate \$20 or more will receive a tax receipt. We encourage all youth to collect pledges of any amount to support our group and our tree planting efforts. Did you also know that 15% of pledges raised go to the Canadian Scout Brotherhood Fund. These funds assist Scouts in developing countries run self-help and community betterment programs that are adapted to local needs and conditions.

Envelopes with pledges are due back on:

- April 30 for Beavers and Cubs
- May 1 for Scouts and Venturers

They also learned the rules and etiquette of trading – no trade is complete unless both parties are happy and they shake on it.



The month ended with a night of basic first aid led by Tic Tac. The Beavers restocked their mini first aid kits and those who did not have one, made one – all working towards their first level of OAS Emergency Preparedness.

The Venturers started March with their big trip to the Adirondack High Peaks in Lake Placid. After preparing their own eggs for breakfast and packed lunch at the Motel we headed for the Adirondack Loj.

With blue skies and only a few degrees below zero, the weather conditions couldn't have been better as they set out from the Loj towards the trail for Wright Mountain.



The trails were beautiful with all the snow in the trees but with Wright mountain being the 16th highest peak in the Adirondacks at a 4,587 feet (1,398 metres) it was no small stroll in the park!



Most of the hike was in snowshoes and as they neared the top there was more need for the microspikes to tackle the ice on the exposed peak.







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There was one sheet of ice that was particularly challenging that the youth helped each other and their leaders to climb.



Their team work and encouragement for each other over the obstacles to the top was beyond impressive. The weather changed quickly on the peak and it was soon time to head back down.



Although physically tired the group made quick work of the descent, with a few steep bum slides; and although exhausted they still managed to muster the energy to clean-up and head into town for pizza and ice cream. For most this was a first to climb a high peak, so to have tackled it in winter is something they should be proud of.



The rest of month they just planned to have some fun; but of course not sitting around...improving their bowling skills and trying out the Xtreme trampoline.
