#### Venturer News

In early May, the Vents embraced the Scouts Canada Great 8 challenges with many of them participating in the various activities.

For Week 1, the youth were challenged to cook something outside, incorporating an unusual or unfamiliar ingredient, and to cook using equipment they haven't used before, or using it in a new way.





These youth rose to the challenge producing some very yummy looking dishes including hickory smoked beef brisket, lavender lemon scones, grilled tilapia on a charcoal

grill, salmon on cedar, and steak with a charcoal bruschetta and dragon fruit salad.

In Week 2, the challenge was emergency shelters. While some found some in the forest, others made ones with items they would find in nature and equipment that would be in their day packs (e.g., emergency blanket, rain poncho, rope).





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Week 3 the whole Company participated in the challenge as they began their planning for a 42 km hike on the Rideau Trail over two days with the intention of being able to execute it together when we are able to do so.

For the next week, we looked at local trails and topographical maps, discussing how youth could make their own trails and detours while staying safe and using the trails to intersect as markers.

Towards the end of the month Venturer Indira led the company in a virtual cooking night where we made pork dumplings with a dipping sauce. Everyone more or less kept to the same pace and the meeting got very quiet as they were all busy eating the delicious dish they prepared.



Throughout the month, the youth filled in the meeting times by playing some online games and enjoying each other's company. Next month, we are hoping to be able to have at least 1-2 in person meetings as restrictions allow.
