- 3-Clean up after yourself or you won't get a special treat like the extra Doritos.


Cubs has always been about life lessons learned.

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The following week, we met at the church for a mandatory prep meeting for those Scouts taking part in the following weekend's Rideau Challenge Journey. This is a hike on a portion of the Rideau Trail through Malborough Forest. There are three levels of hikes and the 101st had

three patrols: two bronze patrols, which are day hikes of about 12-15KM accompanied by Leaders. And one silver patrol, which is a twoday hike of about 25KM, unaccompanied by Leaders but with an overnight camp.



The weekend of the Rideau Challenge was exactly that - a challenge! The weather was very hot and conditions tough. The morning started fine but the Scouts need to navigate a series of trails and roads following a pre-determined route. One bronze patrol took a wrong

turn early on and that added time and walking.



The Scouts hiked for about 6-7 hours total covering between 12-16 KM in sometimes very tough conditions with no shade in some spots or

very wet trails. The Leaders kept a close watch to make sure they rested when needed, stayed hydrated and nourished, checked in at each checkpoint along the way, and even helped carry some gear when needed. The bugs were

Let's say at the end of the hike, they were exhausted and happy to be finished. The silver patrol stayed overnight with a couple Leaders and then finished their hike the day around noon and hiked some 26KM in total.

parents to pick up.








