Saturday, November 5 was a busy community service day for the Scouts. Firstly, 9 Scouts and 3 leaders spent the morning collecting food and donations at Metro on Walkley Road as part of the 27th Annual Scout Food Drive and loading the donated

items into Purolator trucks during their hourly stops. The Venturers provided assistance at the Ottawa Food Bank unloading the donations, sorting items into various bins, and stocking shelves as part of the fall campaign. Secondly, we returned to St. Aidan's church to provide assistance with cleanup following the Holiday Bazaar and luncheon. Scouters Sara and Ruth were assisted by Nick and Adrian in tearing down tables, stacking chairs in both halls, and cleanup in time for the Sunday service. The church volunteers provided a huge thank you for our commitment at their events.

A youth leadership planning was held to decide joint activities for the joint cub-scout camp at Baxter, shelter building, games, and menu planning including Dutch oven cooking then provided ideas for meetings from December 2 to February. In lieu of Remembrance Day, the Scouts visited the War Museum on November 10th and took part of various activities, participated in a self-guided tour paying tribute to Canadian contributions at various worldwide conflicts and toured the vehicle room.

Each year, the 101st puts out a special Christmas Appeal to the youth and parents to help out others in our community. This year, we will again be seeking toques, mitts, gloves and socks for kids involved in Christie Lake Kids as well as gift baskets for Centre 454.



<u>Christie Lake Kids (CLK)</u> creates opportunities for economically disadvantaged children and

youth in Ottawa that changes the trajectory of their young lives through sport, arts, camp, mentoring and leadership programming that recognizes their needs, supports and challenges them. One of these programs is run 2 blocks from St. Aidan's at the Dempsey Community Centre. CLK's summer camp is also just up the road from Camp Opemikon.



We will also put together gift packages for Centre 454, a free daytime drop-in serving the homeless and those at risk of homelessness in the Ottawa area. We are committed to serving those who require assistance in the form of support services, social recreation and essential needs. The Centre provides supportive counselling, crisis intervention, hygiene supplies, laundry facilities and seasonal clothing. The outreach team provides support to disabled individuals as they apply for ODSP (Ontario Disability Support Program) benefits.

These packages can include small toiletries, candies, mitts or a hat.

Our Mitten Tree will be up next week again. We know that you're pulled a dozen different ways at Christmas for good causes. If you take a mitten (or two), your gift will be put to immediate good use. Please bring in your donations by December 13th or 14th.
