We learned how to MAKE and COOK ON a Buddy Burner. Thank you to Kaa who organized this event. A Buddy Burner – for those not in the know, is a very basic camp stove made with two cans – one small to hold your fire, one larger to cook your meal on. Cubs had to opportunity to use tin snips to make holes in their cans, pack their fuel cans with their choice of fuel – wood shavings, paper or cardboard – light their fuel cans with matches, and then cook a grilled cheese on top of the can.



Things we learned from this – it was windy, so that certainly wasn't helping keeping the matches lit. We need ventilation holes at the TOP of the can to make it work better, The food cooks better once the Buddy Burner heats up a bit. Still a good activity. Glad we did it. Wow, the Cubs have certainly been busy this November, and it's not over yet!

We took an opportunity to learn some important First Aid. Cubs learned what to do with a nosebleed, how to apply bandages, how and when to contact 911 and Emergency Services, why it's important to know the address of WHERE you are. We also went through the Cubs First Aid Kit, and made a new friend named ACTAR.





Finally, each Cub had an opportunity to practice with an EpiPen Trainer. These are all scenarios that Cubs will be encountering as they head out into the world. They did a great job and seem to be ready for more.

Our last meeting in November involved the Dreaded Paperwork! It was for a worthy cause though! Cubs worked in their Lairs to plan a Saturday Adventure. Yellow Lair Planned an Outing for December, Blue for January, Green for March and Red for April.





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They helped Akela fill out the Adventure Forms and Emergency Plan for the outings. Each Emergency Plan needed the location of the Adventure and the nearest Fire Station and Hospital to that Adventure. To find this information, Cubs had to read a map. 


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We then went to the Royal Navy Monument at Richmond Landing on the Ottawa River. The monument is built to look like ship sails or a ship's bow or even an iceberg.

We then made the walk up to Parliament Hill and then to the National

War Monument. This was another solemn moment during our walk. We ended by the Peacekeeping Monument across from the National Gallery.



The following week was a camp preparation and planning night for our last camp of 2022 that coming weekend. The Scouts went to Baxter Conservation Area bright and early on Saturday morning. The objective of this camp was to work on some outdoor skills. The weather was clear during the day and hovered around 0 to -5 at

night. The Scouts spent the day building temporary shelters in the woods working in small teams of 2-3 each.



We had some very well-built shelters using deadfall wood, dead leaves and pine needles, pine bows, put together with rope and tarps.



The objective was for them to sleep in their shelters. About half the Scouts there, 6 of them slept in their shelters all night. They were well prepared with the right gear and their shelters were built to be well-insulated. Congrats Scouts!
