 Blue (Home & Community) – Learning how to take care of your home and getting around your community are part of becoming a responsible grownup (Disability Awareness Badge, Family Safety Badge, Guide Badge, Family Helper Badge, Home Repair Badge, First Aider Badge, Law Awareness Badge, Pet Care Badge, Canadian Family Care Award and Emergency Preparedness Award).



We have some great activities planned around these stars including tours of the Ottawa Humane Society, Chaudière Dam, hikes, winter and spring camp. We are also working with our leaders in Beavers and arranging at least one linking activity each month. The second week we sent 3 youth with Scouters Ruth and Shazeela to go camp shopping for the Brotherhood Camp based on their menu selections at the first meeting. This worked well as they managed to keep on budget to feed 17 people.



Last weekend we attended our first Scout camp at Brotherhood Camporee, Riverside-Cedar Campground in Morrisburg ON. This gave the youth a chance to bond, work on their axe/saw permit; fire safety permit, making an evening campfire, setting up our campsite in the dark and meeting other groups from around Ontario, Quebec and the Boys Scouts of America from across the upper US states. Saturday, most

events took place in the main field with an opening with 2000 attendees; the singing of both anthems; the passing of the torch from the American delegation to Scouts Canada as the leader of the camp; and an award ceremony with Scouts Canada, Chief Scout Terry Grant.



Our Court of Honor youth are busy planning a November camp where 6 youth will be camping alone in a temporary shelter overnight at a stand-alone campsite while the remaining group is nearby in a cabin. Leaders will be nearby to offer assistance yet the youth will need to plan their meals, chores, and complete the paperwork for our GC to review. During the day, everyone was able to participate in various activities from tomahawk throwing, rope bridge walking, quad copters, Jungle Cat World presenting some cool creatures (silver fox.
