Why do we do Apple Day:

- It's a chance for the youth to give back to the program that gives them so much.
- We add minimal levies to our registration fees (it means we only keep \$15 of the registration fee you pay) and are thus the lowest cost group around. That means we are almost 100% dependent on dues and fundraising to run the group.
- It's fun ask any who have done it.



Early results show that some \$1,900 was collected, meaning \$1,425 stays with the 101st. Thank you to all who took part.
