Apple Day is our first fundraiser of the year and one that Scouts have been doing since 1932.

Why do we do Apple Day:

- It's a chance for the youth to give back to the program that gives them so much.
- We add minimal levies to our registration fees (it means we only keep \$15 of the registration fee you pay) and are thus the lowest cost group around. That means we are almost 100% dependent on dues and fundraising to run the group.
- It's fun ask any who have done it.



Early results show that some \$2,600 was collected, meaning \$1,950 stays with the 101<sup>st</sup>. Thank you to all who took part.

A huge welcome back to our Cubs for the new scouting year! We are delighted to have a full complement of youth once again, with an exciting mix of new and old faces ready to take on the challenges and adventures that come with being part of the scouting family and the 101<sup>st</sup> Ottawa Cub Pack. We have four lairs this year, each with 8 members, lead by sixers Sophie (red), George (yellow), Kaeda (Blue) and James (Orange). Each lair has an assigned scouter to guide them on the Canadian Path and encourage each Cub to explore and develop the



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six areas of youth development (the SPICES): Social, Physical, Intellectual, Character, Emotional and Spiritual. The assigned scouters are Bagheera (red), Kaa (yellow), Rikki Tikki Tavi (blue) and Baloo and Akela (Orange) and we are raring to go and keyed up for the forthcoming months!



And what better way to start the year in September than with a camp. After two meetings at the Church to get introductions under our belts and practice our camp skills, we headed west for a weekend of adventure at Camp Legewade near Renfrew.

The excellent 2 day program was put together by

Bagheera, with a focus on Scoutcraft and Paddling Outdoor Adventure Skills levels 1 and 2. Despite nature's efforts to blow us off course, many Cubs made the journey on Friday night, for some the first time away from their parents. After mug-up and a knot-tying activity - never easy when you're exhausted - we headed to bed in the cabins for fear of being blown away in our tents. Saturday morning was cool but calm, and after a hearty breakfast (all the Cubs cleaned their own plates and cutlery at camp – so keep up the good work at home!), we divided into lairs to learn about water safety and PFDs, and then as a group about the parts of a canoe and paddle and how to row and steer a boat.



Thanks to the great resources available at Legewade, we were all able to fit into canoes and head out into the bay to practice some of what we had learned. Most Cubs paddled forward, which was the general goal, while at times having some heated philosophical discussions with their rowing partners as to which direction they should actually be heading.



When Akela blew her whistle twice to signal an emergency (it was just a drill and she hadn't actually run out of chocolate), the Cubs were able to raft-up around her in a highly proficient demonstration of oarsmanship.



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After an hour out on the water, we headed in for lunch, and then set-up our tents.

As the day began to heat up, there were many willing volunteers to jump in the lake to cool off (all part of the Paddling skills badge). Legewade has a newly built deck and diving board which was the perfect place to start, and while most jumped with aplomb, of particular note was Cub Matthew who courageously overcame his fear with huge encouragement from the rest of the pack.



Baloo was in his element as "lake security" – playing the role of big bear floating with consummate ease.



Meatballs and pasta was on the menu for dinner, followed by Campfire lead by Rikki Tikki Tavi who entertained us all as Campfire Chief. After a dessert of S'mores, the pack happily headed to their tents after a solid, exhausting day of activity.

Sunday was going home day, but not before we had learned to throw a floating rope and ventured out on a hike to learn about types of shelters and trees. Akela led Scouts' Own and Closing, to wrap up a pretty amazing weekend and a great way to start the year.

### JAMBOREE ON THE AIR – JAMBOREE ON THE INTERNET - 2018

On October 19 to 21, 2018, JOTA will celebrate its 61st Anniversary, and JOTI will celebrate its 22nd Anniversary. JOTA is the largest on-air gathering of Scouts in the world. Scouters of all ages gather together with fellow Scouts around the world by two-way radio.

The Scouts Canada National Museum will be holding an Open House to invite Voyageur Scouters, Youth, Families and Groups to join us and participate in the fun.

Our Amateur Radio Station, call sign VE3SHQ, will be operating under the guidance of our designated radio operator and his team for the whole weekend. VE3SHQ was acquired by our Museum and reactivated in 2017 for the first time in some 20 years, and has operated during Ottawa's Doors Open in 2017 and 2018, during CJ 17 in July 2017, and for the JOTA-JOTI weekend last October. On that occasion contact was made with 21 Stations in 3 provinces in Canada, and 47 Stations in 16 States of the USA. All who participated had fun, several lively exchanges with fellow Scouts in Groups took place and, as part of JOTI, new "internet friends" were reported outside Canada.

The Open House venue will be at the rear of the Main Museum Room at Scout Headquarters. Open House hours will be Friday from 8:00 to 10:00 pm, and Saturday and Sunday from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm. For those interested in Amateur Radio, information will be available about how to qualify for an Amateur Radio license. We invite you to join us, and encourage you to come proudly wearing your Group neckers.
