All our coffee will be available for online sales from October 12th to November 15th. Family and friends can purchase it online and it will be shipped directly to them. No payments or product to handle.

All of the coffee is 100% organic and fair-trade and roasted by Equator Coffee Roasters here in the Ottawa region. The 101st Ottawa will get 35% from all sales and another 5% will go into the No One Left Behind Fund to support scouts in need across Canada be able to afford scouting.

After that, the Beavers needed to move some more, so we went on a nice long hike.





The Scout Leaders are very happy to see the Scouts back safe and sound.




Venturer News
