After 3 years, Apple Day is back! This was our first fundraiser of the year and what a great success it was. Did you know that Scouts have been doing Apple Day in Canada since 1932?

On October 1st, members of the 101st from Beavers to Cubs and Scouts descended on the Elmvale Shopping Mall, Princess Auto and the Tim Horton's location on Hawthorne Rd. to give away apples for donations.





We'd like to thank the parents and Scouters for taking time to make this important fundraiser a huge success and to the local businesses who support us each year we do this.

We raised a total of \$3,019.65, which the 101st gets to keep \$2,479.65 after paying for the apples. Great job everyone! Special thanks to our Venturers for helping to count the money as it came in, and to Akela Cindy and Scouter Ruth who helped manage things at the church.
